THE START OF CHRISTMAS

That was the line a first grader had to deliver at her school assembly which had a Christmas theme. Her parents helped her to practice the line, but her parents weren't entirely convinced of the veracity of the statement. READY FOR HIS RETURN

THE word 'Advent' comes from the Latin 'adventus' or coming. Waiting and anticipating various comings has been a part of human history since the beginning of time. Throughout the history of Israel, we know the prophets spoke of waiting for the advent of the promised Messiah. More specifically, the Israelites waited 400 years with silence from God in between the Old and New Testaments for the coming of the promised Messiah. Moving forward in history, the Christian church around the world celebrates Advent during this season as we make preparations to celebrate the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ. And while we are in this current season of Advent, we are also looking ahead, and in a different kind of waiting room of sorts. Believers today are anxiously awaiting Christ's return – when He will right all wrong, do away with sickness, and wipe away every tear.

But as we wait, let's do so in anticipation and readiness like the five wise virgins in today's passage. As was the custom of the day, virgins prepared to meet the bridegroom. A part of their preparation required them to have lamps ready and trimmed with oil, and because they did not know exactly when the bridegroom would arrive, they needed to take their lamps with them. Ten virgins went to meet the bridegroom. Five wisely took enough oil, but five foolishly did not.

When Christ our Bridegroom returns, let's not be found unprepared and preoccupied like the five foolish virgins. Like those foolish ones, we can't buy or borrow spiritual preparedness when the time comes. On the outside, they looked ready for the arrival of the bridegroom, but they clearly did not care enough about his coming to prepare themselves on the inside. Instead, although we don't know when Christ will return, let us always live in the repentance and redemption Christ offers so that when he comes, we can be ready to greet him and celebrate that day!

TODAY'S PRAYER

Father, The celebration of Christmas is a reminder to me of when You first sent Your Son into a broken world. I do much to prepare for Christmas. In the same way, help me to always prepare myself for the day you will return to claim your bride, the church. As your child, I look forward to your return and anticipate the promise that you will wipe away every tear and heal every broken heart. Until then, I ask that you help me not to live in any pretense, but instead, live in preparedness. Help me be found in Christ when He comes again. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

DIFFERENT ATTITUDES

TODAY we reflect on two seemingly similar, yet vastly different questions in the passages we read. The messenger – Gabriel – is the same. The message – an announcement of a baby boy's birth – is similar. Yet, the attitude of the recipient made all the difference.

In Luke 1:11-18, Zechariah receives the promise of a son. A long-awaited, much-prayed-for baby. And yet, he doubted and questioned God. He asks, "How can I be sure of this? I am an old man and my wife is well along in years." (vs 18). Zechariah doubted God and His goodness and power. He believed more in his inability than God's ability. His attitude brought admonition - Zechariah's mouth was temporarily sealed.

Contrast that with Luke 1:30-31 when Mary received the promise of a son, the long-awaited Messiah. But her attitude is markedly different. "How will this be," Mary asked the angel, "since I am a virgin?" (Vs 34) She didn't doubt God's ability to bring his plan to pass. She was merely asking God how He would accomplish what she believed He would do. Her attitude brought blessing - more than she asked or imagined!

As we go into the Christmas season, are we questioning God and doubting His power? Or, are we trusting that He works things out according to His plan and good pleasure

TODAY'S PRAYER

Lord, I come to you humbly, knowing that when You speak, You act, and when You promise, You fulfill. Help me never to doubt Your power or Your goodness. Thank You for fulfilling Your Word and being gracious even when I give in to fear. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

"At that time the Roman emperor, Augustus, decreed that a census should be taken throughout the Roman Empire. (This was the first census taken when Quirinius was governor of Syria.) All returned to their own ancestral towns to register for this census. And because Joseph was a descendant of King David, he had to go to Bethlehem in Judea, David's ancient home. He traveled there from the village of Nazareth in Galilee." Luke 2:1-4

HE IS ON THE THRONE

CAESAR Augustus – the name itself inspires a certain awe and authority. One can be sure that the decrees of this first Roman emperor were not to be trifled with. Joseph probably had little choice but to follow the Caesar's decree and head to Bethlehem for the census. He *had* to take a long difficult trip with a young, pregnant wife. Imagine Mary riding on the donkey while being nine months pregnant and ready to give birth. Imagine their conversation as they planned this trip. No comforts of home, no closest hospital, no familiar surrounding. Talk about unexpected circumstances.

And yet, despite what it seemed like on the outside, God was orchestrating every detail. Despite the seeming unknowns, God knew every step. He was in perfect control. He knew the exact location, place, time, circumstances, and surroundings when Jesus was to be born. Although Mary would not be able to send out a birth announcement, He prepared a heavenly choir of angels to proclaim the news. Although there probably was not an elaborate baby shower, he sent wise men bearing incredible gifts to greet the child. And even Caesar, as in control of his empire as he seemed to be, was simply being used to fulfill the prophecy found in Micah 5:2 that

the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem - a prophecy written 700 years before Christ was born!

Yes, sometimes our lives may seem a meaningless series of mishaps and misfortunes. It may seem like the "powers that be" are twisting the very fabric of our lives to suit their purposes. But the amazing truth is that God is at work in the background to fulfill His plan. He has put those powers and authorities in place and He is far above all. Yes, the government shall be upon His shoulders!

TODAY'S PRAYER

Lord, As I read the Christmas story and the marvelous unfolding of events prophesied hundreds of years before that time, I stand astounded by Your power. You are the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end. Nothing and nobody can thwart your plans, Lord. Give me the peace that comes with knowing you know about every detail of my life and are aware of every circumstance I face. Help me to be confident in Your power! In Jesus' Name, Amen.

"This is how Jesus the Messiah was born. His mother, Mary, was engaged to be married to Joseph. But before the marriage took place, while she was still a virgin, she became pregnant through the power of the Holy Spirit. Joseph, to whom she was engaged, was a righteous man and did not want to disgrace her publicly, so he decided to break the engagement. As he considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream. "Joseph, son of David," the angel said, "do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife. For the child within her was conceived by the Holy Spirit. And she will have a son, and you are to name him Jesus," for he will save his people from their sins." Matthew 1:18-21

NOT JUST A REGULAR NICE GUY

TODAY'S passage is a familiar one about a really good guy – Joseph, the man pledged to marry Mary. Things must have been going great for Joseph. Perhaps his carpentry business was doing well, and he was ready for the next stage of his life – to marry the woman betrothed to him. Imagine his excitement as he planned and prepared for this new stage of life. You can almost see him planning the home they would live in - he could probably build most of it! Since Mary was raised in a Jewish home, she probably learned some cooking skills from her mother, and Joseph was probably looking forward to Mary's home cooking and sharing life together with her.

Then all of a sudden, with one simple announcement, Joseph's plans fell apart. He found out that his wife-to-be was already with child. Talk about unexpected news! The gospel account in Matthew records that since Joseph was a righteous man, he planned to divorce Mary quietly. That was until God spoke to him in a dream. The moment God spoke to him, Joseph stopped being a regular nice guy. In an instant, He became an obedient follower of God – even

when he didn't know how things would work out. He became a risk taker for God. He didn't just do the good thing. He did the godly thing. He didn't just do the right or reasonable thing. He did the righteous thing. This part of the Christmas story provides a pause and an opportunity to ask some pointed questions. What is my response when God calls me to do the unexpected? Do I shrink from obedience because of fear? Or, like Joseph, do I follow the righteous way because I trust that God knows what He's doing?

TODAY'S PRAYER

Lord, Thank you for giving me the example of Joseph, who followed you as soon as You asked him to trust You. Thank You that when You call, You also equip. Help me to remember that Your grace is sufficient for me and Your power is made perfect in my weakness, and help me to always choose the path that puts You first, no matter what the consequences. In Jesus' Name, Amen.
